

The Role of our Parish Pastoral Council

The Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) promotes and supports the evangelising mission of the Parish, working in collaboration with the Parish Priest to foster the spiritual and pastoral life of all the Christian faithful. The Parish Pastoral Council enables the members of the Parish community to fulfil their baptismal calling to share in Christ's mission and to connect their needs and their strengths with the Parish's plans for the future.

The previous Parish Pastoral Council concluded its term in June last year and gratitude was expressed by Fr Paul on behalf of the parish community for their commitment.

A review of the Parish Pastoral Council was conducted by Daniel Ang, Director, Sydney Centre for Evangelisation, in August 2021.

The re-establishment of a Parish Pastoral Council is one of the key goals of the season of renewal the Parish is currently undertaking. The Pastoral Renewal Team will revise the recommendations of Daniel Ang's review as needed in preparation for the re-establishment of the Parish Pastoral Council mid-2023.

The newly formed Parish Pastoral Council will have a key role in developing the Parish Pastoral Plan in consultation with the parish community. This plan will help guide the continuation of the work of renewal in our parish in the service of God's mission.

How will we Discern Membership?

To discern means to come to knowledge. A process of prayerful discernment is one in which we come to knowledge of the God's desire for our parish. The process involves calling upon the Holy Spirit to be present, being open to input from the community, and providing the opportunity for prayer and reflection in the process. Discernment of parish pastoral council membership is a process of prayer, formation, and the deepening of people's relationship with the Holy Spirit as individuals and as a community of believers.

In the final phase of the selection of Council membership, a discernment process will be used. The actual discernment of new parish pastoral council members involves prayer, the naming of the gifts that an individual brings to the parish community that resonate with the context of the issues facing the parish. At the end of the process each nominee, along with the group that has been gathered, will discern who should come on to the council at this time.
